Dear friends,

This letter contains important information about the COVID-19 outbreak at Harbison Moss Vale. As usual we are sharing the update with our residents and their families, our workforce, and the local community.

COVID-19 outbreak at Harbison Moss Vale:

We are managing a COVID-19 outbreak at Moss Vale and working closely with the Public Health Unit. At last count, we have 9 active resident cases and 4 staff cases. Since the beginning of the outbreak 40 residents and 16 staff have been affected, but most cases involve mild symptoms or are asymptomatic.

We have a well-established protocol for managing outbreaks with the goal of minimising restrictions on residents. Currently, there are no additional visitor restrictions at Moss Vale, but we urge visitors to be mindful that they are entering an active outbreak site. People at higher risk are strongly advised to postpone their visits until the outbreak is resolved.

Visitors are required to wear P2/N95 masks, diligently practice hand hygiene before, during, and after their visit, and restrict their visit to the resident's room, outdoor areas, or the café. Visiting hours remain from 10 am to 4 pm, with special considerations for Partners-in-care and end-of-life visits.

Residents who are not infected are free to move about the home and engage in activities. Residents who have concerns about potential COVID-19 exposure should exercise caution by avoiding close interactions with other residents and restrict their movements (outdoor activities are encouraged when weather permits). Infected or symptomatic residents are required to isolate in their rooms for a minimum of 7 days or as directed by the Public Health Unit.

Please avoid visiting Harbison if you are feeling unwell. If you have concerns about a resident, please be reassured that we will contact you as necessary. There is no need to reach out to Harbison to inquire about the status of a resident.

Heart & Home membership

It is now 3 months since we launched our Heart & Home membership program. Feedback about the program has been positive, and it has been great to see a wide range of clever uses for membership points by residents. The program is a key initiative to support resident choice and autonomy and provides each resident with the flexibility to individualise their care and services to suit their needs and preferences.

Preparing for the high-risk weather season

Many of us recall the 2019-20 fire season, and it seems that 2023-24 will be another warm year with increased risk of heatwaves and bushfires. The Aged Care Quality and Safety Commission recently reminded providers of the importance of being prepared. In the next few weeks, we will be testing our Business Continuity Plan to ensure our staff are prepared for any emergency. Visitors will be asked to cooperate with staff if an exercise is in progress when they arrive, and we apologise in advance for any inconvenience the drills may cause.

Harbison invested heavily in emergency management after the 2019-20 fires, so we are confident in our capacity to keep our homes safe. You can play your part by monitoring fluid intake and for signs of overheating during any unusually warm weather. Older people and people living with dementia are at higher risk of overheating and sunburn, so staff will be monitoring closely and treating heatwave risk as a priority.
